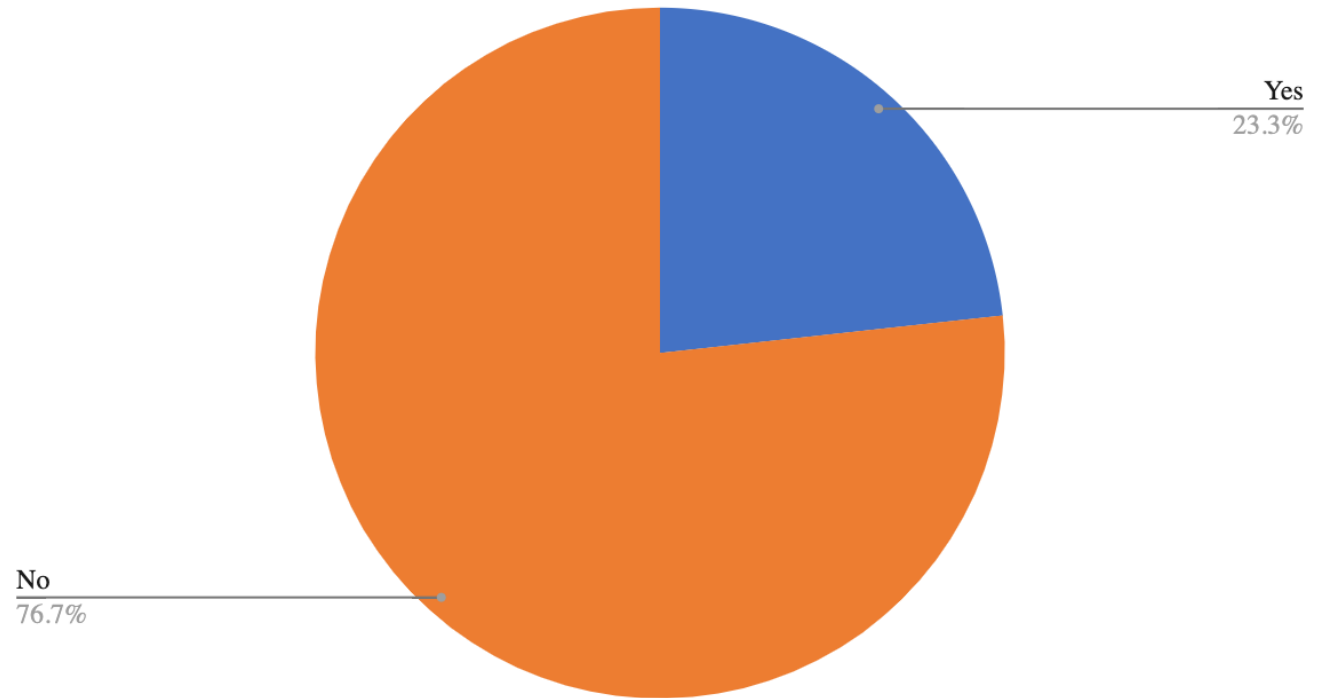
Survey Stats

77% of Texas school employees do not want to be armed or expected to intercept a gunman.

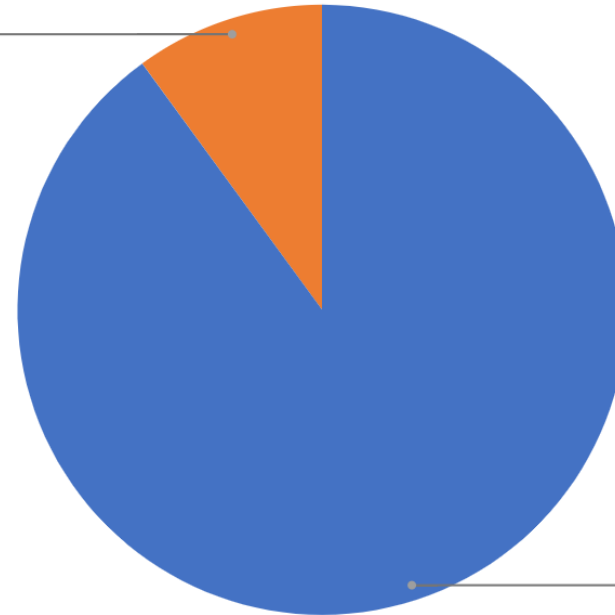
School Employees: Do You Want To Be Armed?

School Employees: Have You Ever Worried About A School Shooting Happening At Your School?

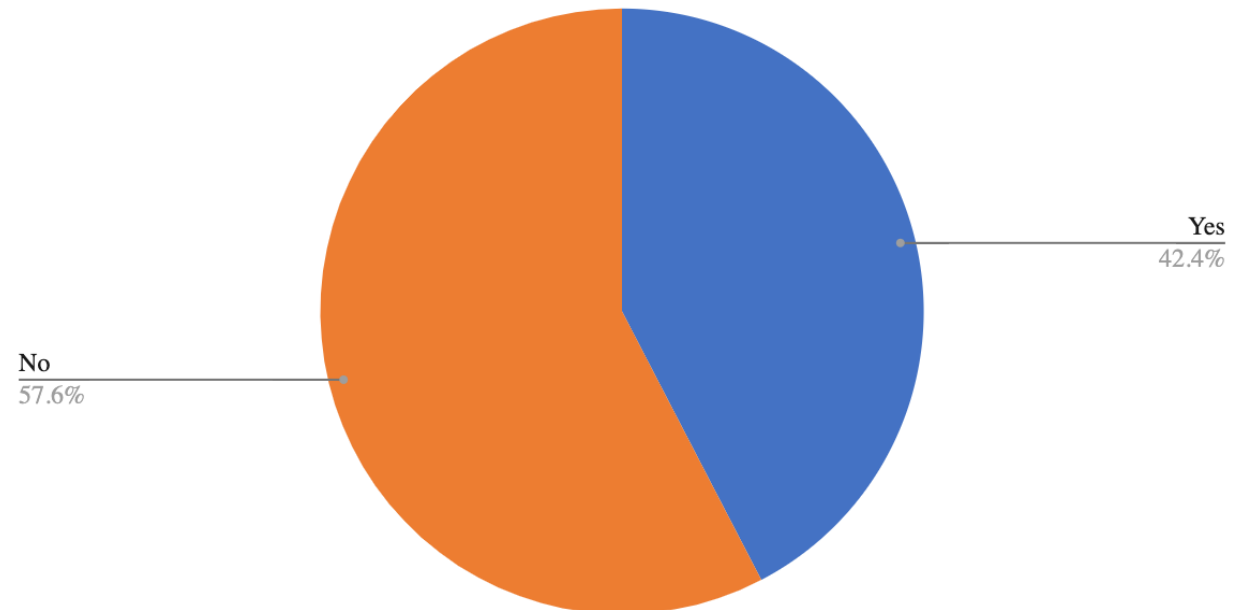

Just under half of Texas school employees say the Uvalde school shooting may affect their decision to return.

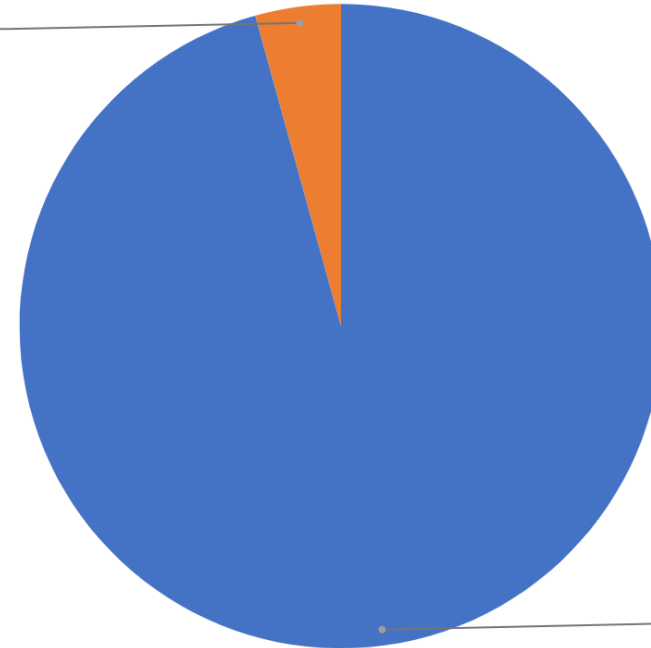
School Employees: Is The Uvalde School Shooting Having Any Impact On Your Decisions About Whether To Come Back In The Fall

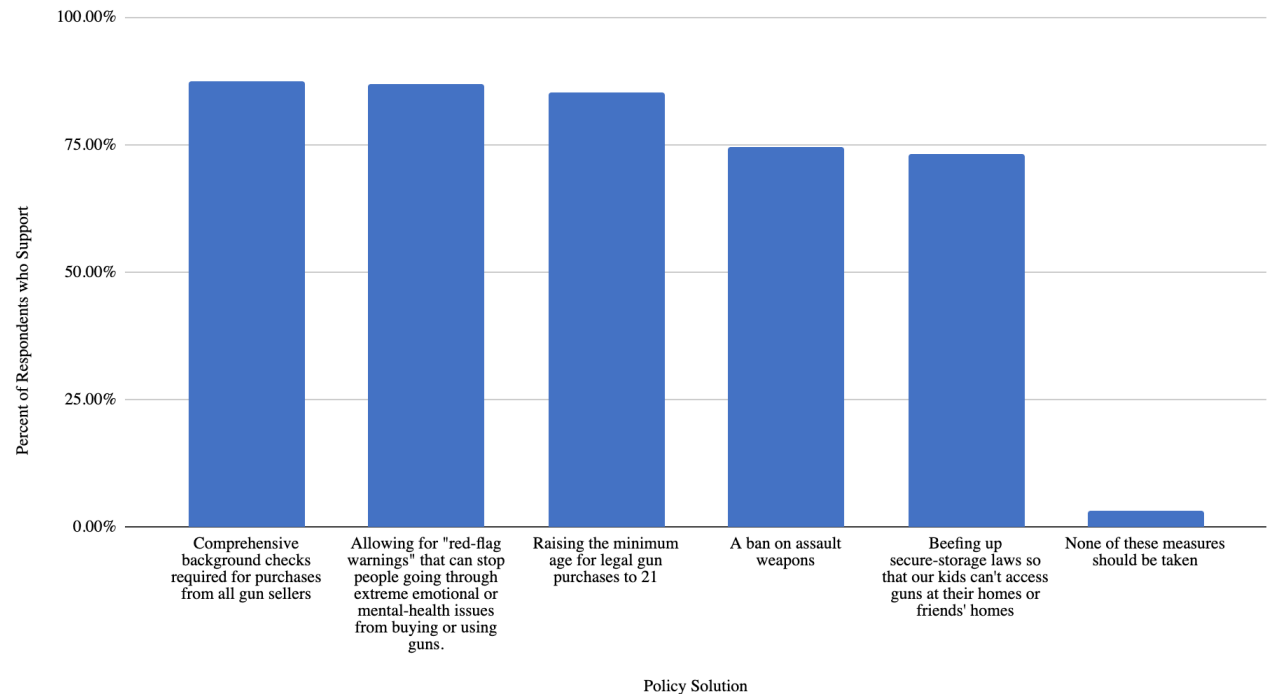

What policy solutions do Texans support?

- **87%** comprehensive background checks required for purchases from all gun sellers
- **87%** allowing for "red-flag warnings" that can stop people going through extreme emotional or mental-health issues from buying or using guns.
- **85%** raising the minimum age for legal gun purchases to 21
- **75% a ban on assault weapons**
- **73%** beefing up secure-storage laws so our kids can't access guns at their homes or friends' homes

Percent of Respondents who Support each Policy Solution

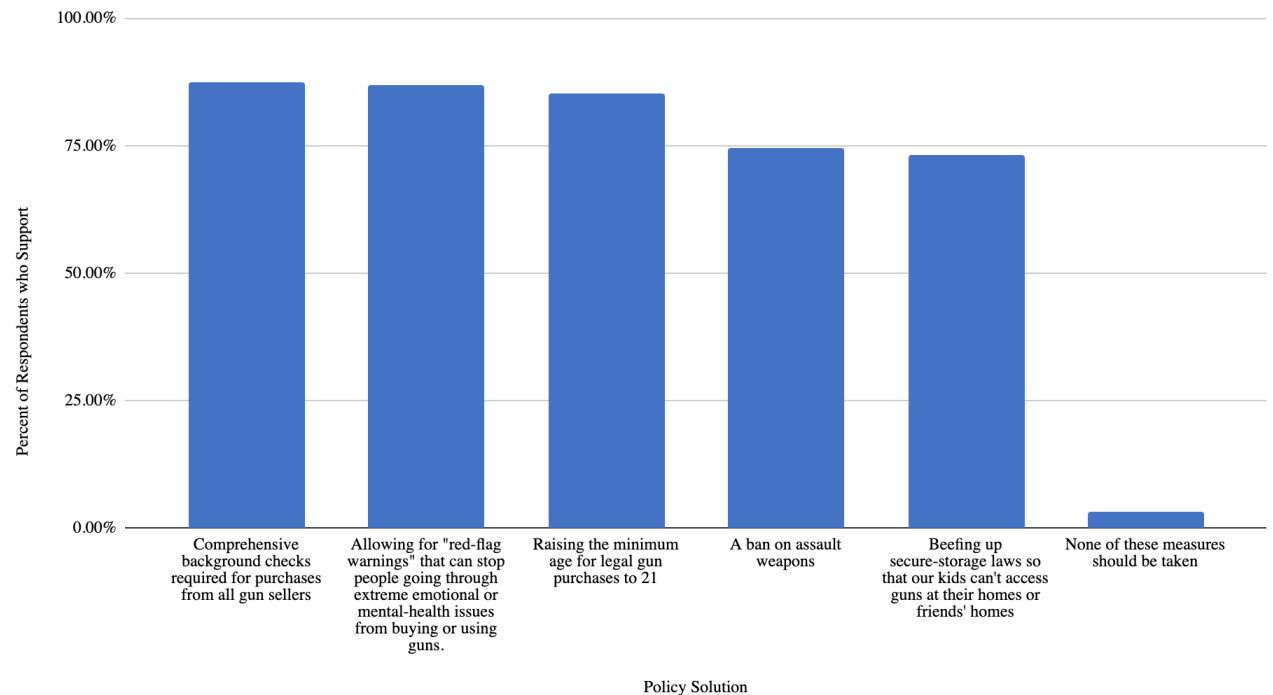


What policy solutions do Texas *school employees* support?

- **99%** comprehensive background checks required for purchases from all gun sellers
- **98%** allowing for "red-flag warnings" that can stop people going through extreme emotional or mental-health issues from buying or using guns.
- **96%** raising the minimum age for legal gun purchases to 21
- **83% a ban on assault weapons**
- **82%** beefing up secure-storage laws so our kids can't access guns at their homes or friends' homes

Texans want action. Only 3% of survey respondents said they want none of these measures put in place.

What does this data tell us?

97% of Texans surveyed want significant action on guns.

- That includes a decisive majority in favor of a complete ban on assault weapons.
- It is categorically false to insist gun reform cannot pass in Texas, something reinforced by previous polling — including the 59% of Texans who said last year they were opposed to the new permitless carry law passed by the Legislature.

What does this data tell us?

The threat of gun violence likely will exacerbate the existing teacher & staff retention crisis.

- 42% of school employees who responded said the Uvalde tragedy could affect their decision to return to their jobs in the fall.
- This follows the 66% of Texas AFT members who have already told us they were thinking of leaving the profession because of stagnant wages, unmanageable workloads, and a lack of respect.

What does this
data tell us?

Combatting gun violence can be a unifying — not divisive — cause.

- 90% of school employees surveyed here said they'd worried about a shooting at their own schools.
- There is broad and decisive agreement on several proposed solutions to this epidemic.
- There are more than 650,000 school employees in Texas. If 90% of them worry about such a tragedy happening to them or their students, that has the potential for a considerable coalition.

What does this data tell us?

Truly, there is one major issue that ties together everything in Texas: funding.

- There is 96% support among all Texans surveyed for increasing school funding to increase mental health resources and implement security upgrades.
- We already know the state's basic allotment does not provide sufficient resources for districts to pay living wages to employees or provide necessary student services. This data bolsters the cause to increase that funding.
- 98% of Texas students are attending schools that do not meet recommended student-to-counselor ratios.
