The Texas AFT survey of 5,100 Texas K-12 school employees, higher-ed employees, parents, and community leaders was conducted in the week after the deadly shooting at Robb Elementary in Uvalde.

I am numb to the violence that occurred in Uvalde. I limit the news I read and watch or I wouldn't be able to continue to teach.

We are sitting ducks in schools, churches, supermarkets and concerts and no one can protect us. Not school administrators, not the goverment, and not the police. As an 8 year veteran in the US Navy, I am against arming teachers in the classroom."
